

Submission my mycompliance technology pty ltd (mycompliance) for modernising Australian business registers

Who is mycompliance?

mycompliance is a software provider that develops solutions to help small businesses and accountants to manage their compliance obligations.

mycompliance is currently developing a corporate compliance and incorporation technology solution to help accountants to incorporate new companies and manage the registry requirements for existing entities that they manage.

What do you see as the main strengths and weaknesses with existing business registry services?

Key Strength

 Comprehensive set of ASIC end points available to enable software developers to offer incorporation, and company secretariat software solutions. These end points enable software developers such as mycompliance to develop feature rich solutions which enable accountants and SMEs to manage their compliance obligations.

Key Weaknesses

mycompliance has experience with two particular weaknesses of the business registers:

- The business data that is available to private sector operators does not include ANZSIC Code, business address & geo-coding data, which is a withholding of data that is difficult to justify; and
- 2. The reliability of the end points and the testing infrastructure is questionable ie. ASIC test servers are frequently not available.
- 3. The ATO and ASIC registers are not co-ordinated (ie. different technology, infrastructure and level of detail)

This submission deals with the first of these weaknesses in detail on the basis that we see an increase in the level of the data available is a benefit to the community.

We understand that the second and third points (reliability of the API's and co-ordination between agencies) is best raised by other players that have had more direct experience with those topics.

What would you like modernised business registry services to deliver for you in the future?

- Enable access to a broad set of data to enable a range of new and improved products and services to be offered.
- The simple creation and management of the end to end process for the creation of new and management of existing entities (business name, ABN, ACN, all other registrations eg. PAYG, etc. in a single workflow despite some of these registrations being managed by different government entities (eg. ATO, ASIC and the Department of Industry).

Do you have a view on the steps the Government could take to make registry data more open and accessible?

 Converting certain ABR data from non-public to public, specifically, making ANZSIC code data ANZSIC Code, business address & geo-coding data public information available (*this ANZSIC data is currently classified as non-public information).

Proposal:

 Convert the ANZSIC Code, business address & geo-coding data data held in the ABR to be 'public information' to enable users of the data to understand the industry and location of businesses.

Background:

 The ABR collects ANZIC data at the time that it issues an ABN, but unfortunately, the specific data point on the industry code for each business is held back because it is classified as 'non-public information' and is therefore not released by the Department of Industry to be made available on the ABN-Lookup service.

The decision on what is public and non-public data appears to have been made as part of the establishment of the ABR back in ~2000 and hasn't changed since. I understand that it was based on a perspective from the ATO at the time to be protective of tax related data to ensure that personal or business financial information is not made public, and that thinking was applied to the ABR when it did not need to.

The list of public vs non-public information is excerpted in Appendix One. A small change to the relevant legislation would likely be needed to convert this information from non-public, to public. It also seems incongruous that the address of many businesses is already available on google – but not available via the official register.

Benefits:

Knowing the industry of a business would enable service providers to tailor the experience for those businesses. For example, by knowing the ANZSIC code for a business, accounting software players could offer those businesses a custom chart of accounts and tailor the language and suggested add-ons for a new client.






Outside this long list of public agencies, no private entities have access to this this data.



<u>List of business industry codes</u> is 40 pages long = very detailed




ATO has a nice lookup <u>service</u> which could be extended to provide access to industry codes via API.
